PRAYER OF CONFESSION (from Psalm 51)

Forgive our hard-heartedness, our lack of imagination, our inability to read the value of each person and to bring out the best in everyone we meet. Teach us humility, keep our hope alive, sustain our love for all humanity, until conflict is stifled and we stand together in your love.

One: We now take a few long breaths, and offer into the silence what weighs heavy upon us.
